
Quality

- Injuries from hazards in people's homes, such as trips or falls, electrical problems or fire risk
- Respiratory problems caused by damp which leads to the spread of mould and fungi
- Cold homes are linked to higher excess deaths in winter, respiratory diseases and circulatory problems
- Overcrowded living conditions can put strain on family relationships, reduce privacy and limit the space for children to study or play



Living in a non-decent home is associated with worse health

Self-rated health by housing tenure and whether living in a non-decent home, England





Number of non-decent homes (millions), by tenure: England, 2006-22





Percentage of households that are overcrowded by tenure: England, 1995/96–2022/23









Number of residential moves experienced by households with children up to age 15 years by housing tenure: UK, 2000 to 2015








The number of households in temporary accommodation has more than doubled in a decade



Cost of living: Financial concerns were worst among people whose housing costs had risen

Percentage of respondents reporting the state of their financial situation and future worries, by housing cost (HC) and pay change category: UK, 2023





Moving to healthy homes

- Renters Reform Bill is applying the Decent Homes Standard to the private rented sector
 - Must ensure that standards are fit for the future
 - Enforcement must be properly resourced
- More widely a healthy home also needs to be secure and affordable:
 - Recent increase to Local Housing Allowance will help but comes after people have struggled for a long time
 - Ending no fault evictions important but risk it is watered down
