New responsibilities

CQC has new roles:

 The Health and Care Act gives CQC a role in reviewing integrated care systems



 It also gives CQC a new duty to assess how local authorities are meeting their social care duties under part 1 of the Care Act

These will allow us to look more effectively at how care provided in a local system is improving outcomes and reducing inequalities.

We've engaged extensively over the last 18 months on how we'll do this. We want to bring together a view of quality across a local area and put people at the centre of driving improvement in care.



Local authority assessment and system reform



- LA assessments will help us to illustrate the quality of care in a local area and provide independent assurance
- We will be developing an evidence base on how LAs are delivering their Care Act duties by; reporting on what we find locally and nationally, and highlighting challenges, risks and the impact on the local population
- We will support improvement through showcasing best practice and new/innovative ways LAs are providing care and support to local people.
- We will use our evidenced and independent voice to inform and influence wider system reform

Local authority assessment from April 2023

- Since April, we have been reviewing published evidence and data, across all local authorities, focusing on two quality statements
 - Care provision, integration and continuity
 - Assessing needs
- Alongside this, we are running full end to end pilots of our assessment approach with the following five local authorities:
 - Birmingham City Council
 - Nottingham City Council
 - Lincolnshire County Council
 - North Lincolnshire Council
 - Suffolk County Council



CQC scope: local authorities

Theme 1: Working with people

- Assessing needs
- Supporting people to live healthier lives
- Equity in experience and outcomes

Theme 2: Providing support

- Care provision, integration and continuity
- Partnerships and communities

Theme 3: Ensuring safety

- Safe systems, pathways and transitions
- Safeguarding

Theme 4: Leadership

- Governance, management and sustainability
- Learning, improvement and innovation



Local authority pilot assessments

We will be piloting the following assessment methods:

- Data and insight held by CQC across several metrics
- Reviewing publicly available information and documents shared by the local authority
- End to end case tracking of a small number of individuals
- Working on site directly with local authorities and conducting interviews/group discussions including with patient representatives
- Insight from voluntary groups and advocacy groups/organisations
- These will then be evaluated.



Gathering evidence

In our assessments, we will gather and assess evidence from a range of sources both on and off site, and both virtually and in-person, depending on the evidence we need for a quality statement.



- For all the quality statements we will seek feedback from relevant staff and leaders to build a full understanding of how the council is delivering its Care Act duties.
- This includes, but is not limited to, the Chief Executive, DAS, social work teams, commissioners and councilors, eg: the adult social care portfolio holder, members of the Overview and Scrutiny Committee.



Role of councillors in LA assessments

Councillors are a bridge between the community and the council.

We'd love to hear your views on;

- how local people are experiencing social care in your area and any patterns you have seen
- any local community organisations and projects that benefit adult social care
- how you are working with local community and organisations to develop a vision for the area and working with partners to improve services and outcomes
- how you contribute to shaping the council's adult social care strategy
- how you provide checks and balances on the executive, testing performance, raising issues of concern, holding decision makers to account.



Preparing for assessment

- Review the themes of the Care Act that our assessment process is designed to test out, including the specific statutory requirements
- Review our assessment process how performance will be measured and rated
- Be aware of the preparation being done by the Director of Adult Services (DAS)
- Contribute to the self-assessment: this describes current performance, risks and challenges and the plans to address them
- Share your insights into local people's experiences and outcomes of adult social care in your area with the DAS
- Highlight any local activities, organisations or projects that are improving people's well-being.
