## New research and statistics

### Employment, pay and workforce:

#### LGA Statistical Alert

The May 2019 Statistical Alert produced by LGA Research and Information shows Consumer Price Index including owner occupiers housing costs (CPIH) increased to 2.0 per cent in April 2019 from 1.8 per cent in March 2019. Retail Price Index (RPI) annual inflation rose to 3.0 per cent in April 2019 from 2.4 per cent in March 2019.

The number of people in employment in Great Britain was 31,837,000 for the three months to March 2019; this has increased by 93,000 compared to the previous quarter to December 2018, from 31,744,000. Unemployment in Great Britain for the same periods was 1,272,000 for the quarter to March 2019, a decrease of 58,000 from 1,330,000 in the previous quarter to December 2018.

Figures provided by XpertHR, an online resource for employment law HR good practice and benchmarking, showed the median whole economy pay settlement level of 2.5 per cent to the three months ending April 2019, unchanged from March 2019.

Results from the Labour Research Department (LRD) survey provided by XpertHR showed the median level of union-negotiated awards for the whole economy was 2.7 per cent for the three months ending April 2019, unchanged from the same figure in March 2019.

The Make UK (formerly Engineering Employers Federation) mean for manufacturing rose to 2.6 per cent in the three months ending April 2019, from 2.5 per cent in March 2019.

#### Police staff earnings survey 2018 – England and Wales

This LGA survey was sent to police forces in England and Wales in order to inform on-going national negotiations by providing accurate and up to date information about the composition of the workforce and provide a means for costing claims, offers and their consequences. The survey was supported by the National Police Chiefs Council (NPCC), the Association of Police and Crime Commissioners (APCC), the Police Staff Trade Unions and the Home Office. ## **Excess winter mortality data – 2016/17 Final - England**

The 2016/17 Excess Winter Mortality Index (% extra deaths, all adults) for England was 21.2 per cent, an increase from 14.7 per cent in 2015/16. This is the percentage of extra deaths that occurred due to the winter weather. The index is calculated as the number of excess winter deaths divided by the average non-winter deaths, expressed as a percentage.
