

In 2023, we continued to take every opportunity to support, promote, and improve local government. Here is a selection of highlights.

JANUARY

The Government announced the extension of the energy support scheme for businesses, with councils now eligible for support.

FEBRUARY

We highlighted the need for a step change in devolution with our **Levelling up locally inquiry report**, and our lobbying efforts helped secure an extension of the Bus Recovery Grant and £2 bus fares, as well as £842 million of additional funding through the Household Support Fund, for councils to support people in their local area to pay for energy bills or groceries.


MARCH

APRIL

Following successful LGA lobbying, the Government announced councils would retain 100 per cent of their Right to Buy receipts for 2022/23 and 2023/24, and we launched the Local Leadership Framework for Councillors.







LOCAL GOVERNMENT WHITE PAPER

MAY

The Department for Education launched a £165 million fund for communities to improve local skills and help get more people into jobs.

JUNE

Following extensive LGA lobbying, the Government launched the £60 million Swimming Pool Support Fund to help public pools with increased cost pressures and investment.

JULY

We welcomed more than 2,600 people at the 2023 LGA Annual Conference in Bournemouth, where our new Chair, Cllr Shaun Davies, set out his ambition to develop a Local Government White Paper. Also, alongside WLGA, we gave evidence to the UK Covid-19 Inquiry on behalf of local government in England and Wales.

AUGUST

LGA-commissioned research showed that schools within their council continued to outshine academies, providing evidence for why councils should be given powers to open **new** maintained schools.

SEPTEMBER

The Government unveiled a £1.1 billion Long-term
Plan for Towns - allocating funds based on need, not competitive bidding - for 55 towns to invest in local priorities; and we hit the airwaves to raise concerns about RAAC in schools.

OCTOBER

Through our **Step Ahead campaign** during National
Care Leavers' Week, we
highlighted support for
those leaving care, and
refreshed the support we
provide to councils; and
we concluded our **party conference season** with
the LGA holding events
at the Liberal Democrat,
Conservative, Labour and
Green conferences.

NOVEMBER

We briefed parliamentarians and took to the media

ahead of the **Autumn Statement** to highlight the financial pressures facing councils and, following our longstanding lobbying, the Government confirmed the restoration of the **Local Housing Allowance rates** to the 30th percentile of market rents.


DECEMBER

Following November's
King's Speech, we set out a
roadmap for influencing
legislation and highlighted
our Debate Not Hate
campaign during a Lords

debate on democracy and standards in public life. We achieved widespread media coverage with our finance survey results, which revealed that almost one in five council leaders and chief executives in England think it is very or fairly likely that their chief finance officer will need to issue a Section 114 in 2024. By the end of the year, we secured more than £2 billion for Homes for Ukraine and associated refugee-related projects.








Working for you
